### From the President

#### Welcome!

We are pleased to confirm the permanent appointment of Tracey James as conductor of the Swing Band.

Jeremy Thomas from Beginner Band and Ayla Relf from Concert Band have taken on roles to help us do the work we do. Jeremy is our new Publicity Officer on Committee and Ayla has offered to look after Friends of the Bands. Welcome!

#### **General Business**

Our budget has taken a hit as the annual grant from the council has been reduced and we look like only having one BBQ at Bunnings as a fundraiser, so we have placed a short term hold on buying any new music until we can review or budget for the year.

We are planning a working bee to rearrange the hall - the main aim is to use the storage room more efficiently by moving the orange and blue storage racks in.

We have asked Council to install lights above the percussion area.

Committee has approved a request from Graham Martin to form a specialist band based on the Duke Ellington Cotton Club Band. These bands have a defined composition of instruments and music. They plan to rehearse on Friday nights.

The annual Christmas Carols at Victoria Point that we usually play at has been cancelled because they couldn't find volunteers for the committee to organise it. The committee is looking for another option.

## Out in front

This edition we introduce a new section called out "Out in front". Each edition we will feature a different conductor. We begin our series with our Director of Music, Mr John Allen OAM who celebrated 50 years of conducting in June.

John has had many years' experience

with brass, concert and marching bands, both in this country and in Canada and the USA. His early experience as a player and conductor was with brass bands in Tasmania. He was a successful competition performer on the cornet and soprano cornet before becoming a conductor, and won the Tasmanian State Championship on the latter instrument in 1961.

John began his conducting career with the Invermay Silver Band in Launceston in June 1959. That's 50 years ago, and he has been conducting ever since. With the Latrobe Federal Band, he won the C Grade Championship at the famous South Street, Ballarat, band contest in 1965, the first Tasmanian band to win a grade championship at that event. In addition, he won the Best Conductor award (all grades) at that contest.

In 1969 he moved to North America where he studied and taught music. He earned a BMus degree from the University of British Columbia in Vancouver and a MMus degree from the University of Oregon, majoring in school instrumental music and conducting. Following his student days he was a band teacher in two Canadian high schools for three years. In Vancouver, John was a member of the University of British Columbia Concert Band and conducted an Italian Alpini Community Band, consisting of Alpine war veterans. While at the University of Oregon, he played trumpet in the University of Oregon Big Green Fighting Ducks (100piece football) Marching Band.

John returned to Australia in 1979 to take up the position of Lecturer in Music at the Southern Cross University in Lismore, NSW. His particular areas were Theory, Aural Skills, Keyboard and Ensemble Conducting. He also became conductor of the Lismore City Concert Band, which he helped form and which he directed with great success over 18 years. This Band performed regularly in concerts, parades, festivals and eisteddfods in the Northern Rivers Area of NSW and Brisbane. The Band's successes included winning the secondary school bands' section of the Lismore Eisteddfod for 10 successive years up to 1995. One of the highlights of his time with the Lismore band was in 1988 when the Band (with 90 players) represented the City of Lismore at the World Expo in Brisbane. While in

Lismore he also conducted the South Lismore Primary School Band for nine years. He taught many brass students in Lismore, who were actively involved in AMEB and HSC examinations, eisteddfods and concerts. A number of these students have continued with their love of music by becoming music teachers and players in state orchestras and bands.

While living in Lismore, John prepared and presented over 500 weekly programs of brass band music on Lismore radio station 2NCR-FM for ten years, 1979-1989.

His success with bands and brass students earned him the title of Lismore Citizen of the Year in 1992 and won him the honour of carrying the Olympic Torch on its way to Sydney for the Olympic Games in 2000.

John relocated to Brisbane early in 2001 after his retirement from the University, and was appointed conductor of the Redland Shire (now City) Concert Band in January of that year. This Band has had consistent eisteddfod success under his leadership, winning its section in the Redlands Eisteddfod every year since 2001, and performs regular concert programs in the Redlands region. The 8 years he has spent with this Band he considers the most pleasurable and rewarding of all his band years. **He looks forward to many more such years.** 

John has adjudicated concert and brass bands at national and state level, as well as band, choral and instrumental sections of the Lismore and Grafton Eisteddfods. He has also written articles on band matters and has over 50 compositions and arrangements to his credit. As well as the degrees in music, he holds BA and Med degrees, the DipEd and ALCM diplomas.


John's contribution to community band music and students, over such a long period of time, was recognised with the award of the Order of Australia Medal in the Queen's Birthday Honours list in 2008.

His interests include first and foremost his family, numerous styles of music other than band music, especially Spanish music (he has a sizeable collection of tapes, LP records and CDs to prove this), reading, languages, the Collingwood Football Club and cricket.

He boasts that he has appeared (briefly) on stage as a ballet dancer (in Swan Lake), a can-can dancer (to the Can Can) and a marching "girl" (to the march 'St Kilda'). He also attended the same school, but not at the same time, as the legendary Errol Flynn (Hobart High School) and was operated on in Vancouver by the same doctor who attended Flynn on his death-bed! He also taught a student in Canada who managed, after he left school, to get himself on the FBI's Most Wanted list ('armed and extremely dangerous', he was described as).

John is married to Jillian, who teaches at Trinity College, Beenleigh, and who has supported him totally throughout their time together. They have 2 adult children and 2 small, chirpy granddaughters.
